Based on OIPR's annual Graduating Senior Survey, students rated their improvement in specific learning goals.

The following is the percent of students who said their DePaul education improved these characteristics "quite a bit" or "very much"

- •Improved ability to analyze arguments, investigate assumptions, and think critically - 85%
- Improved ability to communicate effectively in writing 79%
- •Improved ability to function effectively as team member 77%
- •Increased my capacity to reflect on my own values and ethical frameworks – 75%
- •Improved my ability to communicate effectively in speaking 74%
- •Ability to use computer programs/ tools to support my learning 68%

What Employers Seek in New Graduates

- Employers and alumni felt communication skills are the most important qualities for a new graduate, with employers rating this skill #1, and alumni rating both verbal and written communication in the top ten most important abilities.
- Honesty/integrity and computer skills were among the most important qualities employers seek in new graduates, reflecting sociological and technological changes over the past five years.
- Although alumni rated <u>under-standing moral issues</u> and <u>using technology</u>, these did not appear among the top ratings of ten abili-

ties and knowledge.

- Alumni rated the ability to <u>function independently</u> as #1, while employers did not include it among the most important qualities they seek in employees.
- Three in four DePaul 2001
 graduating seniors rated ana lytical skills, written communication, teamwork skills, and the
 ability to reflect on values and
 ethics as qualities that improved quite a bit or very much as a result of their DePaul education.
