LETTER TO THE UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY

University Colleagues,

On behalf of the entire Enrollment Management and Marketing team, I am pleased to present DePaul's 2013 enrollment summary. This annual report describes the current enrollment profile and how it has changed over the years as we have pursued DePaul's ambitious enrollment goals.

Higher education institutions nationwide face significant challenges. Demographic, economic, competitive and technological changes have led to unprecedented turbulence and growing unpredictability in enrollment planning. As just one example, increasing price sensitivity has created significant pressure on universities to deliver strong student outcomes that clearly demonstrate the value of a college degree, while simultaneously forcing institutions to provide more financial aid to keep the net price of that education within reach.

While DePaul has achieved a prominent and enviable position in the competitive landscape, it is not immune from the challenges. Enrollment at the graduate level is particularly volatile but undergraduate enrollments also demonstrate increasing vulnerability, especially in liberal arts programs. In nearly every area, DePaul's enrollment outcomes mirror national trends.

In the face of these challenges, the 2013 enrollment profile offers evidence of DePaul's resilience and competitiveness. We remain, for the 16th consecutive year, the largest Catholic university in the country. This year's freshman class has the highest average high school GPA and ACT score ever. Students of color represent a university record 34 percent of the entire student body. The four-year graduation rate increased for the sixth straight year. New health science programs are demonstrating remarkable growth, as are our online courses.

Amid these achievements and challenges, one thing becomes clear: The business is changing, and DePaul must as well. Because of the efforts of all of who teach and work at DePaul, we are well-positioned to do so. Thank you for all that you do to ensure our future success.

UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT

DePaul remains the nation's largest Catholic university for the 16th consecutive year with a total student enrollment of 24,414. This is consistent with last year, down 552 students or 2 percent.

Undergraduate Enrollment – 16,420 students enrolled this fall, comparable to 2012.

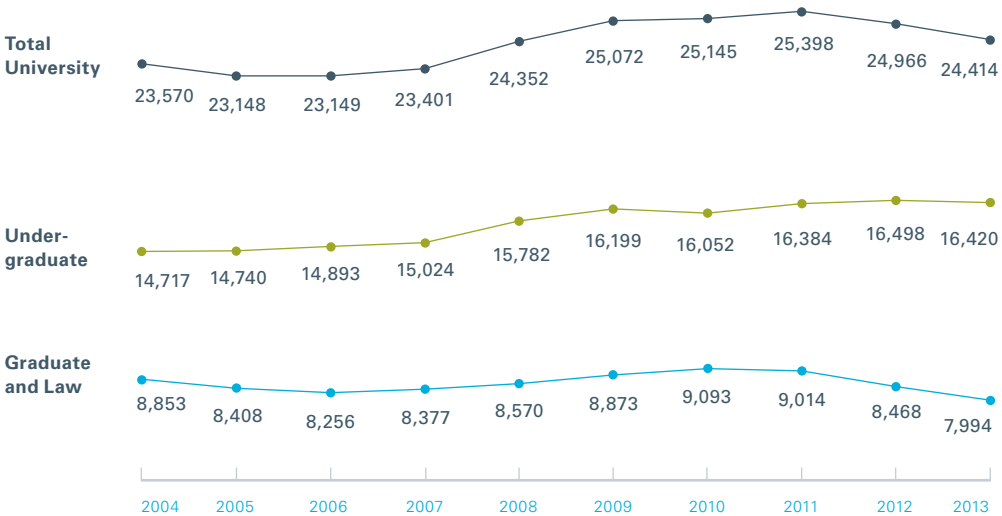
Undergraduate enrollment continues to grow as a share of total enrollment, accounting for 67 percent of total enrollment in 2013, up from 65 percent in 2009.

Graduate Enrollment – 7,103 students enrolled this fall, down 6 percent from 2012, accounting for 29 percent of university enrollment.

Law Enrollment – 891 students enrolled this fall, down 4 percent from 2012. Law enrollment accounts for 4 percent of university enrollment.

Students registered for a total of 296,722 credit hours in fall 2013. Seventy-nine percent of these credit hours were generated by undergraduate courses and 21 percent by graduate and law courses.

- » 6 percent are international students (on all visa types).

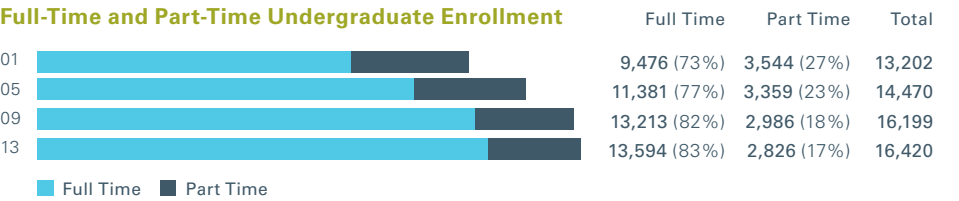

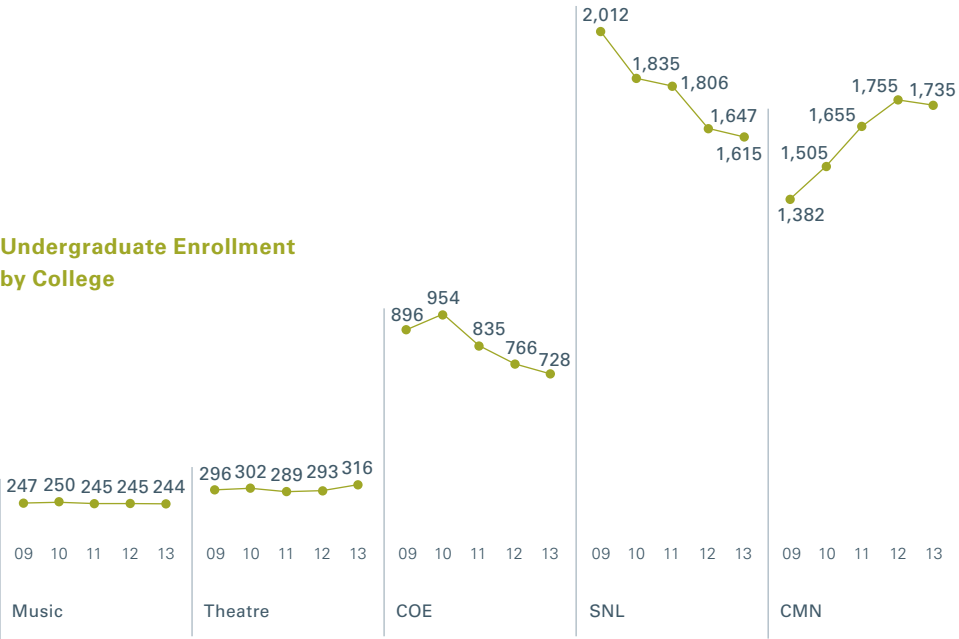
UNDERGRADUATE ENROLLMENT

DePaul enrolled 16,420 undergraduates this fall, comparable to 2012 and 1 percent larger than the 2009 class five years ago.



- » Full-time enrollment has increased by 3 percent compared with 2009, while part-time enrollment has declined by 5 percent.
- » Eighty-three percent of all undergraduates are full-time, up from 82 percent in 2009 and 73 percent in 2001.
- » All colleges have more than 89 percent full-time undergraduate enrollment, with the exception of SNL, which is mostly part time (90 percent).
- » BUS accounts for over a quarter of the undergraduate enrollment in 2013 at 26 percent, down from 28 percent in 2009. Compared with 2009, CSH, CDM and CMN account for a larger share of undergraduate enrollment, while the proportions in LAS, SNL, COE and Music have declined.

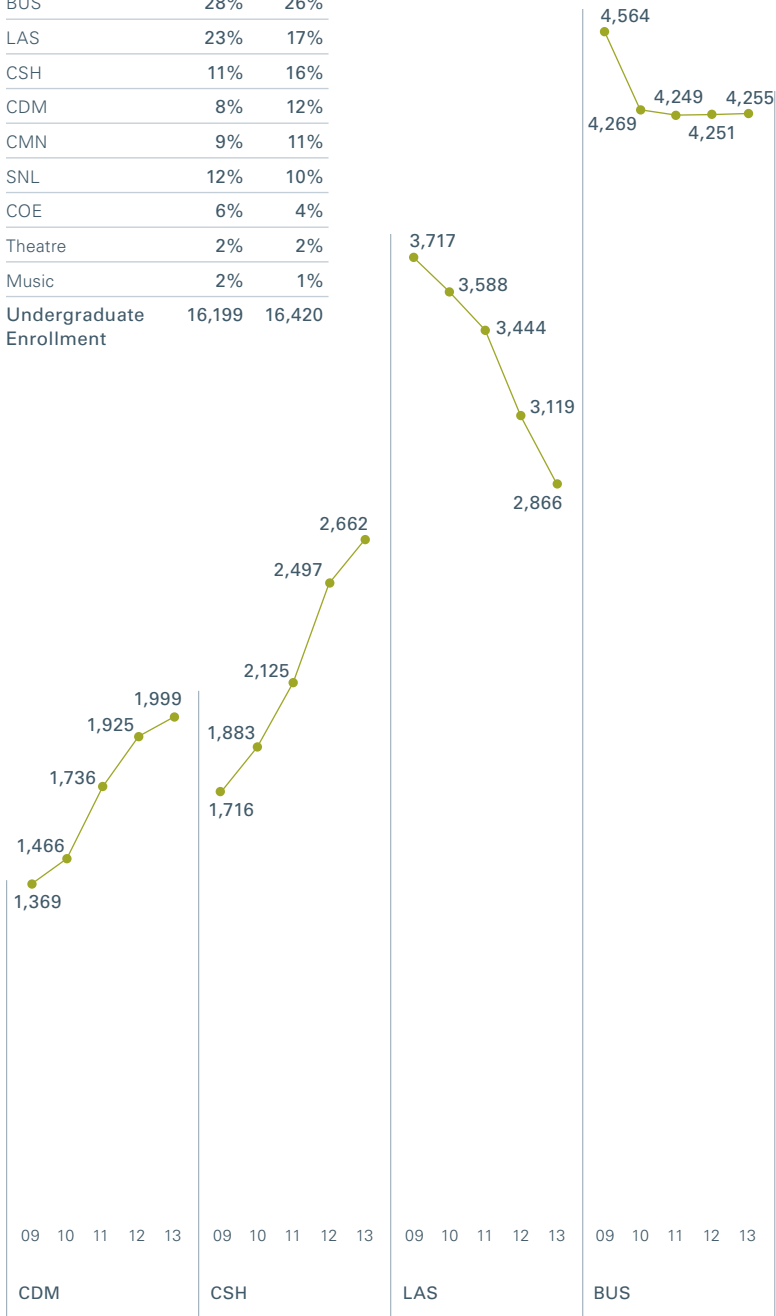
Undergraduate Enrollment by College

FRESHMAN ENROLLMENT

DePaul welcomed a class of 2,425 new freshmen in fall 2013, which is 6 percent fewer than last year’s class of 2,593 students. Although freshman enrollment declined overall, enrollment in CSH, CMN and Theatre was up, compared with 2012. The largest proportion of freshmen enrolled in BUS, followed by LAS and CSH.

By Academic Profile

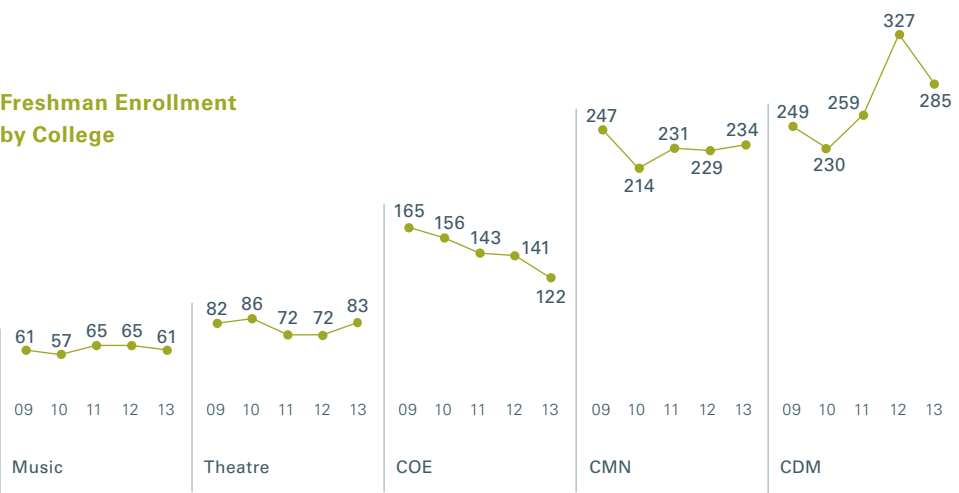
The freshman class is strong on all measures of academic preparedness.

- » The average high school GPA—the best predictor of academic success at DePaul—is the highest ever at 3.65, compared with 3.45 in 2009.
- » The average ACT composite score of all DePaul freshmen is 25.4,* with the middle 50 percent of the class scoring between 23 and 28. Nationally, the average ACT composite score is 20.9.
- » Fifty-seven percent of freshmen graduated in the top 25 percent of their high school class, the highest rate in history.

*ACT average in 2013 includes scores for students who applied through the test-optional pilot program and submitted scores post-admission for research purposes.

Freshman Enrollment by College

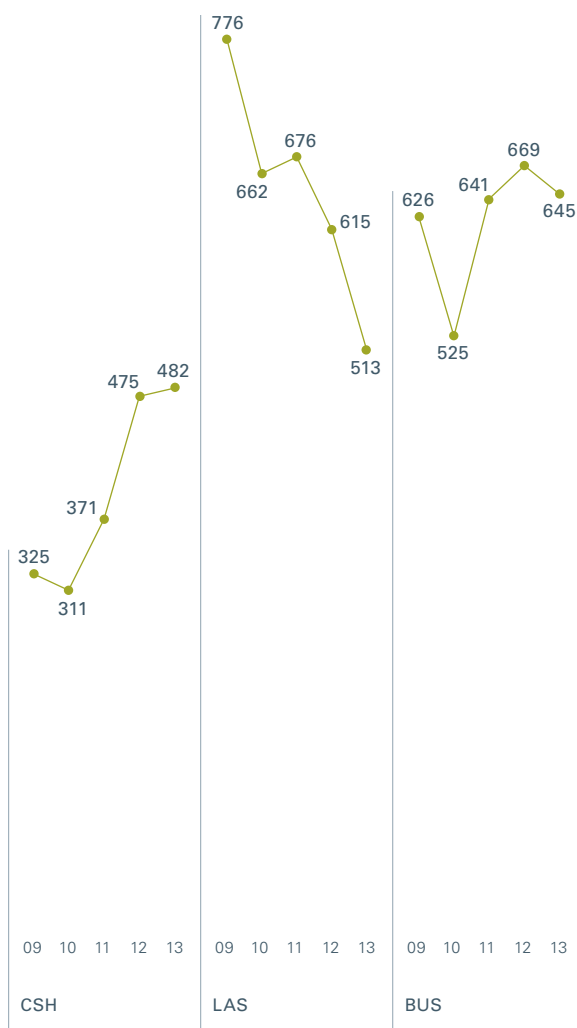

TRANSFER ENROLLMENT

Enrolling in fall 2013 are 1,698 new undergraduate transfer students, down 2 percent from 2012. Transfer enrollment in CSH, SNL, COE and Music increased. Together, the four largest colleges for transfer enrollment—BUS, LAS, CSH and SNL—enroll 74 percent of transfers. Sixty-five percent of transfers came from community colleges. Forty-three percent of this fall’s new transfers entered DePaul with sophomore class status.

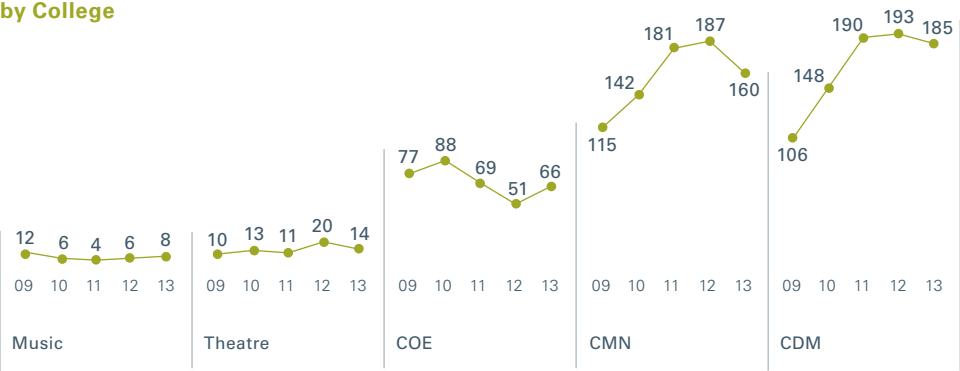
Transfers continue to be a strategic priority in DePaul’s enrollment mix. This fall, transfers account for 41 percent of new degree-seeking undergraduates, compared with 40 percent in 2009. Throughout 2012-13, DePaul enrolled a total of 2,737 transfer students and 2,635 freshmen.

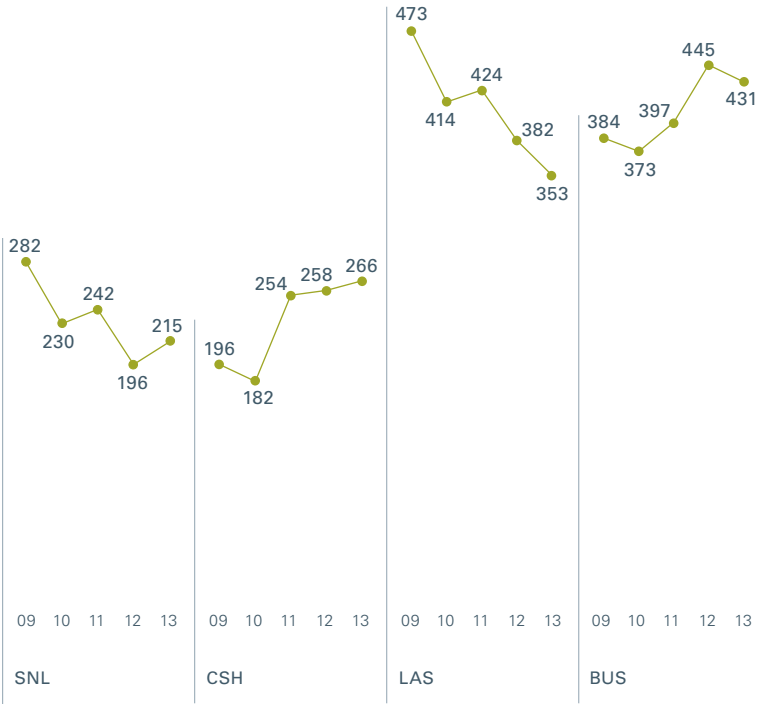
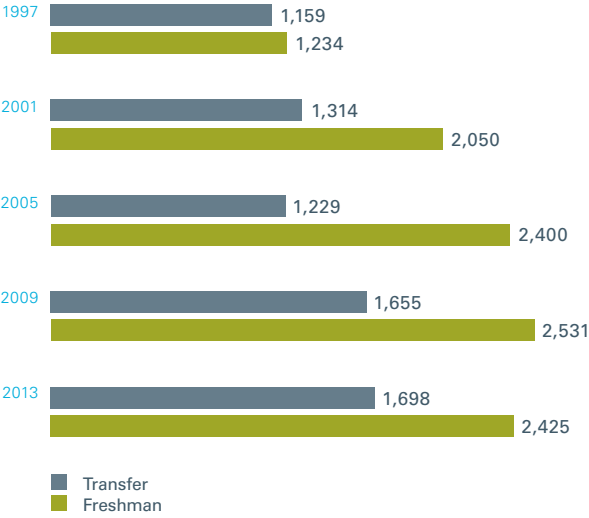

FRESHMAN AND TRANSFER DEMOGRAPHICS

Freshman

By Gender

- » Less than half of all new freshmen are male (42 percent) in 2013, compared with 41 percent in 2009.
- » Enrollment in COE, CMN, LAS, Theatre and CSH is more than 69 percent female.

By Geography

- » 47 percent come from suburban Chicago or elsewhere in Illinois, 36 percent from out of state and 17 percent from the city of Chicago.
- » DePaul's five top feeder states for enrolled out-of-state freshmen are Michigan, California, Ohio, Wisconsin and Minnesota.
- » The 866 out-of-state freshmen come from almost 650 high schools throughout the nation.

First-Generation Freshmen

- » Enrolling this fall are 803 freshmen from families where neither parent has a college degree. First-generation students represent 33 percent of the freshman class.
- » Nearly half (48 percent) of this year's first-generation students come from suburban Chicago.

Transfer

By Gender

- » Half of all new transfers are male (51 percent) in 2013, compared with 48 percent in 2009.
- » Enrollment in CSH, COE, Theatre and SNL is more than 50 percent female.

By Geography

- DePaul remains a top destination for transfer students in Illinois.
- » 60 percent of transfers are from Illinois community colleges.
 - » 25 percent are from out-of-state institutions.
 - » 8 percent are from Illinois private and for-profit four-year institutions.
 - » 5 percent are from Illinois public four-year universities.
 - » 2 percent transferred with credit for equivalent experience.

By Age

- » 70 percent of new transfers are under 24, 17 percent are 24-29 years of age, and 13 percent are 30 or older.
- » SNL enrolls 41 percent of all new transfer adults and 69 percent of those who are 30 years of age or older.
- » All of the other colleges are 78 percent or more traditional age (under 24).

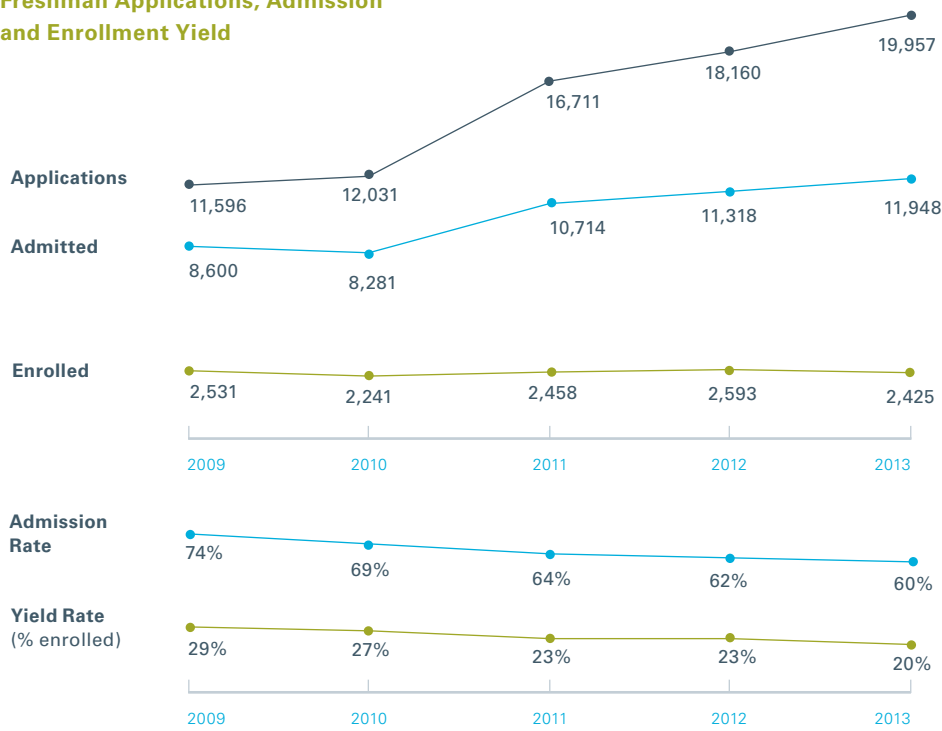

FRESHMAN ADMISSION TRENDS

DePaul received 19,957 applications for fall 2013, a 10 percent increase over 2012 and a 72 percent increase from 2009. A total of 1,541 students applied through the test-optional pilot program.

- » Applications increased to all colleges this year, with the exception of LAS, Music and COE.
- » CSH received 28 percent of the applications at 5,680, up 22 percent from last year.
- » Similar to the past two years, 40 percent of applications came from out of state. California, Michigan and Ohio were the largest senders of out-of-state applications.

Freshman Applications, Admission and Enrollment Yield



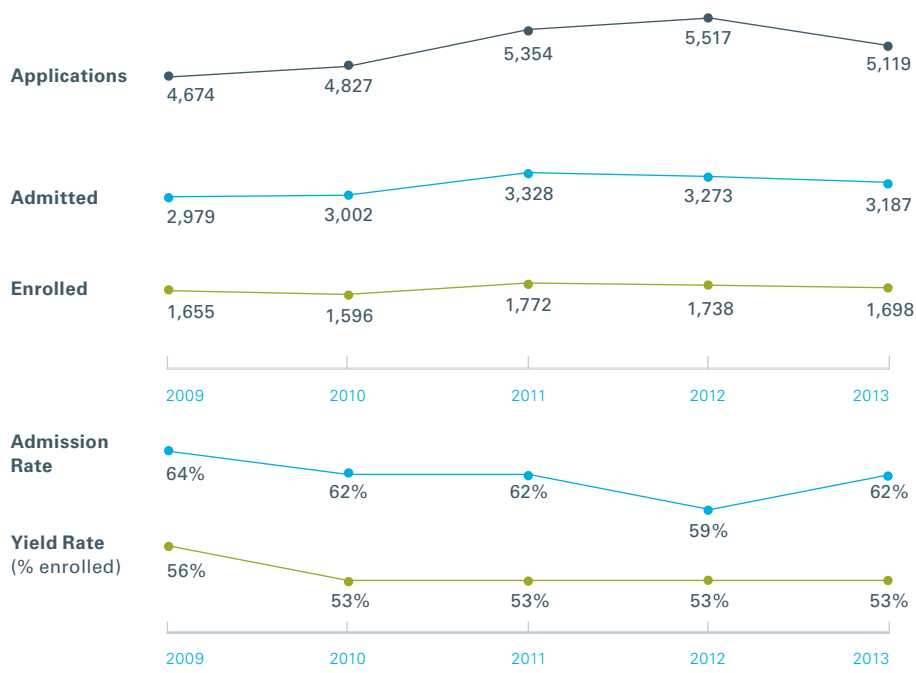

TRANSFER ADMISSION TRENDS

Transfer applications declined by 7 percent to 5,119 from 2012's all-time record of 5,517 applications.

Transfer Applications, Admission and Enrollment Yield



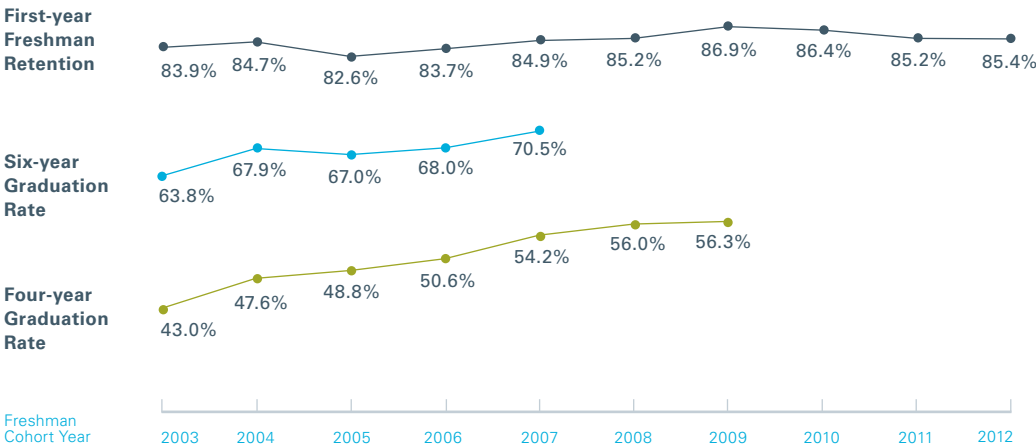
FRESHMAN RETENTION AND GRADUATION RATES

Returning in fall 2013 for their sophomore year are 85.4 percent of the fall 2012 full-time freshmen, compared with 85.2 percent of the prior year's freshman class.

One of the most significant trends is the continued increase in four-year graduation rates over the past six years. This year, the four-year graduation rate for the 2009 freshman class was the highest ever at 56.3 percent, up from 47.6 percent for the 2004 class.

Of the fall 2007 full-time freshmen, 70.5 percent had graduated from DePaul six years later, up from 68.0 percent for the 2006 class.

DEGREES GRANTED

In 2012-13, DePaul awarded 6,948 degrees. This was a 13 percent increase from 2008-09. DePaul awarded 21 percent more bachelor's degrees, 4 percent more master's degrees and 3 percent more doctorates. Law degrees, JD and LLM combined, were down by 5 percent during this time.

BUS and LAS together awarded half of the bachelor's degrees last year, with 28 percent and 18 percent, respectively. Another quarter of the degrees were awarded by CMN (13 percent) and CSH (13 percent).

Thirty-four percent of bachelor's degrees were awarded to students of color. The largest proportion of bachelor's degrees awarded to Asian-American and Hispanic/Latino graduates was from BUS (55 percent and 27 percent, respectively), and the largest proportion awarded to African-American graduates was from SNL (35 percent).

Time to Degree

A total of 1,899 bachelor's degree recipients in 2012-13 entered DePaul as freshmen and took four years and one quarter, on average, to complete their degrees. Bachelor's degree recipients in 2011-12* who entered as transfers (1,341 students) took, on average, three years to complete their degrees in colleges other than SNL, and SNL transfer students (248 students) took four years and two quarters.

Master's degree recipients enrolled in an average of 8½ quarters to complete their degrees, although this has declined over time. Time to degree varies by college. Graduating master's students in Music and CMN enrolled in 6½ quarters; students in BUS, CSH, LAS and COE enrolled in 8 to 9 quarters; and Theatre, CDM and SNL students enrolled in 9 or more quarters on average to complete their master's degrees.

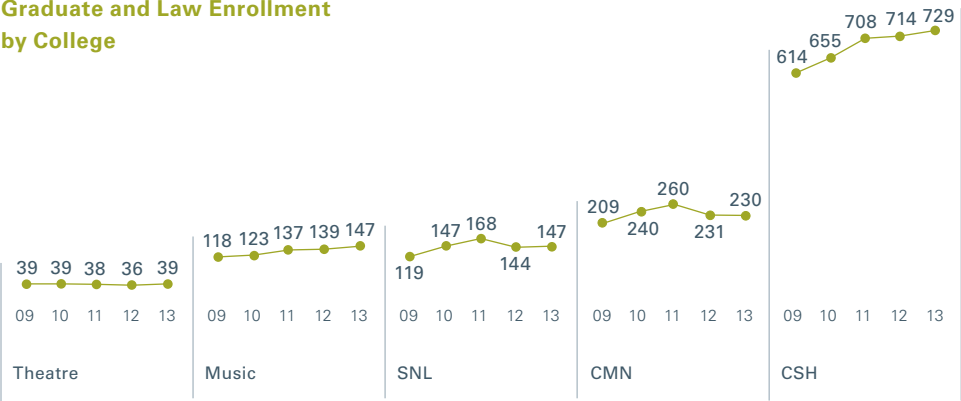
Graduate Enrollment

In fall 2013, a total of 7,103 graduate students enrolled (excluding Law). Although overall graduate enrollment is down 6 percent from the 2012 class of 7,544 students, enrollment in five of the nine colleges increased this year. CDM's enrollment increase of 5 percent made it the largest graduate college in 2013, exceeding KGSB enrollment by 123 students. A total of 93 percent of all graduate students are master's degree students, 4 percent are doctoral students, 2 percent are in certificate programs, and 1 percent are non-degree seeking.

- » 61 percent are enrolled full time, taking eight or more credit hours per quarter, up from 58 percent in 2009. Full-time graduate enrollment varies by college. The colleges with primarily full-time graduate enrollment include Theatre (100 percent), CMN (76 percent), CSH (68 percent), KGSB (67 percent) and COE (64 percent). The largest proportion of part-time graduate enrollment is in SNL (84 percent).
- » 28 percent are students of color (2,004 students), up from 26 percent in 2012. Enrollment of students of color has increased by 14 percent since 2009.
- » 14 percent are under 24 years of age, compared with 10 percent in 2009. Music had the highest proportion of young graduate students at 37 percent, compared with 33 percent last year; 15 percent of KGSB enrollment was under 24 years of age, compared with 21 percent in 2012.
- » 12 percent, or 871 graduate students, are international students (on F1 and J1 visas). This is down from 946 students in 2012.

Graduate and Law Enrollment by College



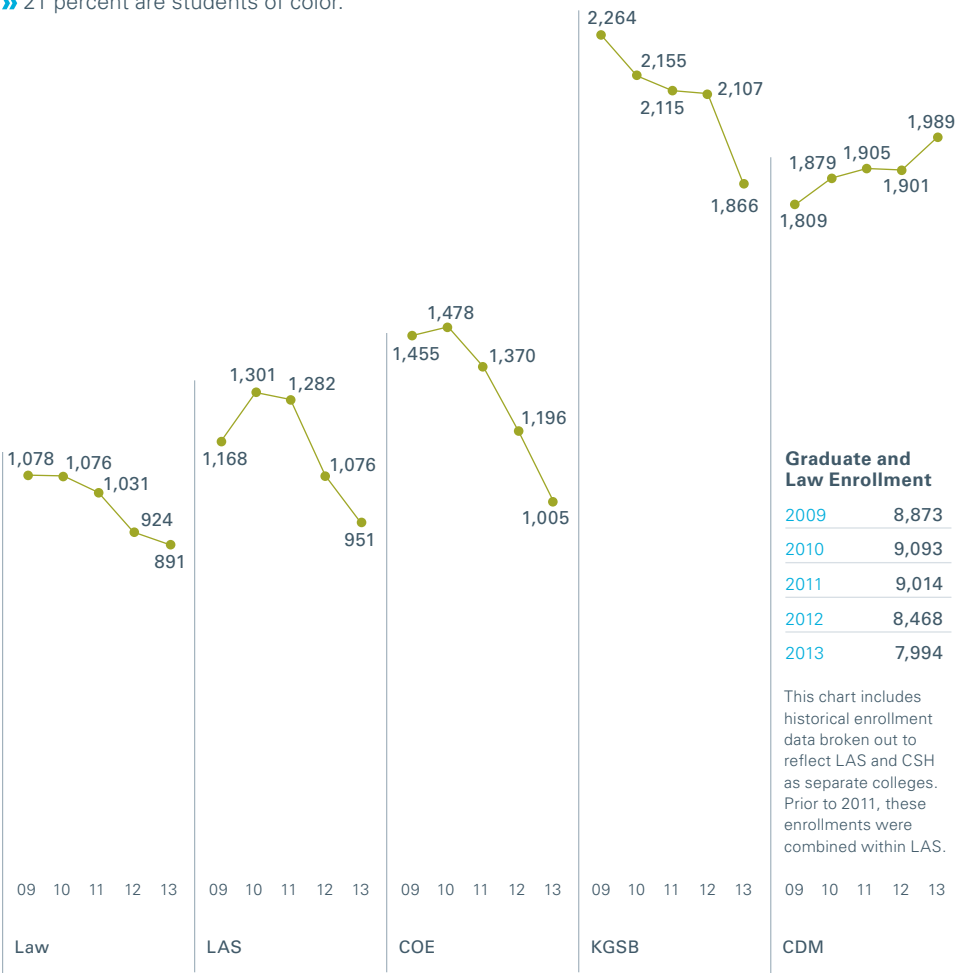
Law Enrollment

A total of 891 students enrolled in the College of Law this fall, a decline of 4 percent from 2012 and 17 percent from 2009. Most law students are enrolled in the JD day program—81 percent—with 15 percent in the evening program and 4 percent in the LLM program.

- » 53 percent are female (51 percent in 2012).
- » 43 percent are from out of state, 37 percent from the suburbs and other Illinois locations, and 19 percent from the city of Chicago (compared with 46 percent, 34 percent and 19 percent, respectively, in 2012).
- » 31 percent are under 24 years of age (29 percent in 2012).
- » 21 percent are students of color.

New Master's Enrollment

The 1,596 new master's students enrolled in fall 2013 are a diverse group:

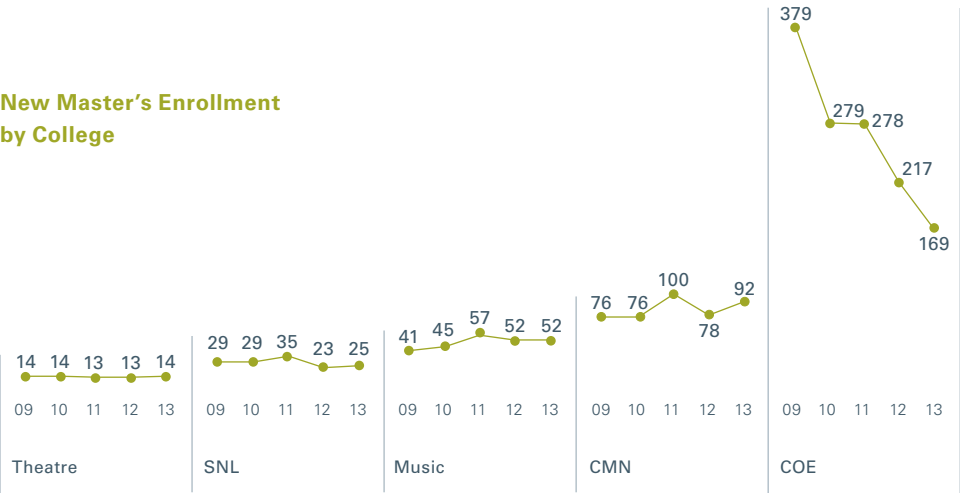
- » 57 percent are female (56 percent in 2012).
- » 46 percent are between ages 24 and 29, and 31 percent are under age 24 (43 percent and 35 percent, respectively, in 2012).
- » 28 percent are students of color (25 percent in 2012).
- » 13 percent are international students on F1 and J1 visas (20 percent in 2012); 53 percent of international students enrolled in KGSB and 29 percent in CDM.

The new master's students come from a wide range of locations:

- » 35 percent are from the city of Chicago (35 percent in 2012).
- » 35 percent are from suburban locations and elsewhere in Illinois (33 percent in 2012).
- » 25 percent are from out of state (24 percent in 2012).
- » 5 percent are from international locations (8 percent in 2012).

New Doctorate Enrollment

A record number of 63 new doctoral students enrolled this fall, compared with 34 new students in 2012. Half (51 percent) of these students were in CSH (including 17 new students in the nursing doctoral program), 37 percent were in COE, 8 percent in LAS and 5 percent in CDM.

- » 76 percent are women.
- » 30 percent come from out of state, 33 percent from the city of Chicago, 32 percent from suburban Chicago and other locations in Illinois, and 5 percent from out of the country.
- » 30 percent are students of color; 19 percent are African-American.

New Law Enrollment

The College of Law welcomed 312 new law students this fall, compared with 318 in 2012. Of the law students, 252 students are enrolled in the day program, 47 in the evening program and 13 in the LLM program.

- » 58 percent are under 24 years of age (54 percent in 2012).
- » 50 percent are women (57 percent in 2012).
- » 40 percent are from out of state, 38 percent from suburban Chicago and other Illinois locations, and 21 percent from the city of Chicago (49 percent, 30 percent and 20 percent, respectively, in 2012).
- » 18 percent are students of color (25 percent in 2012).

DEPAUL LOCATIONS AND CREDIT HOURS

The Lincoln Park and Loop campuses generated the majority of fall credit hours, although the proportion has dropped from 92 percent in 2009 to 89 percent in 2013 due to the increase in the hours generated by online classes. In 2013, online courses generated 24,129 credit hours, or 8 percent of all fall credit hours. This is a comparable share but more credit hours than the suburban campuses generated at their peak in 2002 (21,314 credit hours).

A total of 4,721 students registered for at least one online course, including 3,131 undergraduate and 1,590 graduate students. This is a 9 percent increase from 4,347 students in 2012, largely due to a 15 percent increase in undergraduates registered for online courses. Half of SNL students, 52 percent of graduate CDM students and 25 percent of undergraduate CDM students are taking at least one online course in the fall.

Of the students registering for online courses this fall, 1,870 students (40 percent) are enrolled exclusively online and not simultaneously enrolled in other campus-based courses (762 undergraduates and 1,108 graduate students). This is a 2 percent increase from 2012. Continuing students make up 86 percent of this enrollment; part-time students account for 78 percent. Of the exclusively online students

- » 68 percent are continuing part-time students.
- » 57 percent are master’s students;
43 percent are CDM master’s students.
- » 27 percent are undergraduate seniors;
20 percent are SNL undergraduate seniors.
- » 36 percent are students of color.

DIVERSITY

DePaul enrolled 8,213 students of color in 2013, an increase of 1 percent (or 56 students) from 2012. Students of color account for 34 percent of total enrollment, 37 percent of undergraduate enrollment, 28 percent of graduate enrollment and 21 percent of law enrollment.

The number of students who consider themselves multi-racial/non-Hispanic continues to grow annually though the rate of growth has slowed. A total of 78 percent of these students were undergraduates.

International Students on F1 and J1 Visas

In total, 1,328 students have international student status (on F1 and J1 visas), compared with 1,324 in 2012 and 733 students in 2009 (an 81 percent increase). This year, about a third of international students are undergraduates and two-thirds are graduate and law students. International students represent 5 percent of total university enrollment.

International Undergraduate Enrollment Trends

- » 431 international undergraduates enrolled across all of DePaul's colleges, up 23 percent from 2012 and up in almost all colleges with the exception of CDM (down 11 percent).
- » Enrollment doubled from 2009 to 2013 and at least half of these students enrolled in BUS annually.
- » International undergraduates come from almost 70 countries, with China the largest source of undergraduate enrollment for the past three years. In 2009, the largest number came from Korea.
- » 54 percent come from five countries: China, Saudi Arabia, Korea, Malaysia and Pakistan.
- » 61 percent are men.

International Graduate and Law Enrollment Trends

- » A total of 897 international graduate and law students enrolled in 2013. The largest proportion of students enrolled in KGSB and CDM (50 percent and 32 percent, respectively).
- » Enrollment is down 8 percent from 2012, primarily due to a loss of 103 international students in KGSB (a 19 percent decline). However, enrollment in CDM, CSH, LAS and CMN grew from 2012 by 34 students combined, partially offsetting the decline in KGSB.
- » Enrollment grew by 71 percent from 2009 to 2013, although growth in KGSB outpaced that in CDM and changed the college mix. The proportion enrolling in KGSB increased from 32 percent to 50 percent during this time, while CDM went from 47 percent to 32 percent.
- » Students come from almost 75 countries, with over half from China and two-thirds from China and Saudi Arabia combined.
- » 57 percent are women (70 percent of KGSB and 33 percent of CDM are women).

NATIONAL COMPARISONS

DePaul is the largest private, not-for-profit university in the Midwest and the 12th largest private institution nationally. DePaul has been the largest Catholic university in the nation for 16 consecutive years, having exceeded St. John’s University in total enrollment in 1998. DePaul enrolled 15 percent of the enrollment at the 10 largest Catholic institutions in 2013.

Since 2004, enrollment at the largest Catholic institutions increased by 9 percent to almost 161,000 students, an increase of almost 14,000 students. From 2009 to 2013, enrollment at these institutions grew by 2 percent, or just over 3,000 students, and growth has slowed over the past three years. From 2012 to 2013, total enrollment was flat or in decline at eight of the 10 largest schools, with the exception of St. Leo and Loyola University Chicago (increases of 2.2 percent and 1.5 percent, respectively).
