LETTER TO THE UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY

University Colleagues,

On behalf of the Division of Enrollment Management and Marketing, I am pleased to present DePaul's 2014 enrollment summary. This annual report describes the current enrollment profile and how it has changed over the years as we have pursued the university's ambitious enrollment goals.

The dynamics of the past several years have increased the uncertainty in enrollment planning. Lingering economic instability, combined with unprecedented competition, has made enrollment less predictable. Graduate programs have been particularly volatile. The university has responded by budgeting conservatively in anticipation of modest enrollment declines. Against this backdrop, I am proud to report on DePaul's successful enrollment outcomes for 2014.

With an overall enrollment of 23,799 students this fall quarter, DePaul surpassed its target by 1.2 percent. New student enrollment was the cornerstone of this year's success. Freshman enrollment is 7 percent over target and 5 percent more than last year. The class' academic profile is among the best ever, highlighted by record enrollment in the Honors Program, and the diversity profile remains strong at near-record levels. On the graduate side, new student enrollment surpassed projections by 10 percent and last year's total by 5 percent. Innovations such as the Corporate and Employer Outreach, or CEO, initiative and new scholarship programs were crucial to this effort.

We still face challenges moving forward. Projections for the foreseeable future reflect stable enrollment and tuition revenue. Our outcomes from this fall, however, generate optimism about our ability to succeed in these challenging and competitive times.

The foundation of the university's accomplishments is the incredible dedication and effort of all who teach and work at DePaul. You continually deliver the high-quality education and world-class service that make DePaul such a special place. Thank you for all that you do to ensure our future success.

UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT

DePaul remains the nation's largest Catholic university for the 17th consecutive year with a total student enrollment of 23,799. This is slightly lower than last year, down 615 students or 2.5 percent.

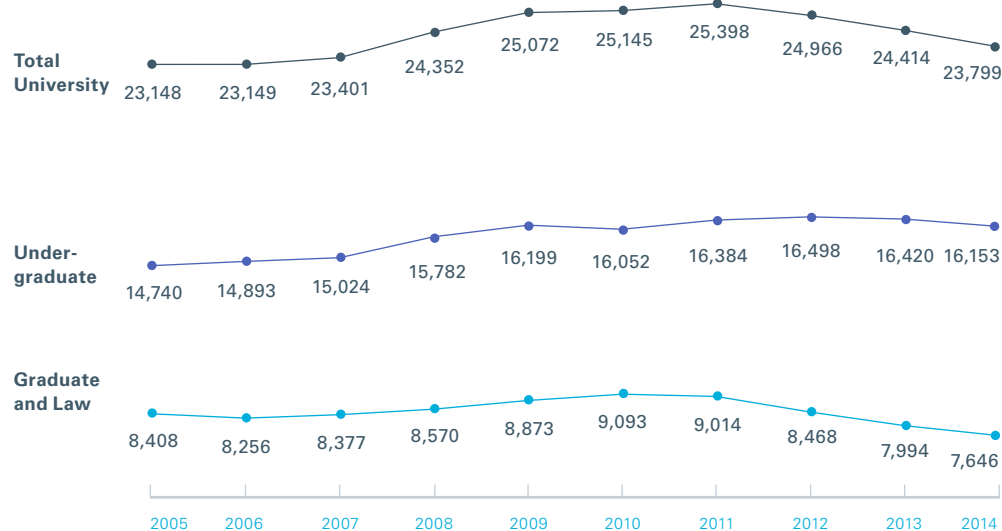
Undergraduate Enrollment – 16,153 students enrolled this fall, compared with 16,420 in 2013. Undergraduate enrollment continues to grow as a share of total enrollment, accounting for 68 percent of total enrollment in 2014, up from 64 percent in 2010.

Graduate Enrollment – 6,844 students enrolled this fall, down 4 percent from 2013, accounting for 29 percent of university enrollment.

Law Enrollment – 802 students enrolled this fall, down 10 percent from 2013. Law enrollment accounts for 3 percent of university enrollment.

Students registered for a total of 294,999 credit hours in fall 2014. Eighty percent of these credit hours were generated by undergraduate courses and 20 percent by graduate and law courses.

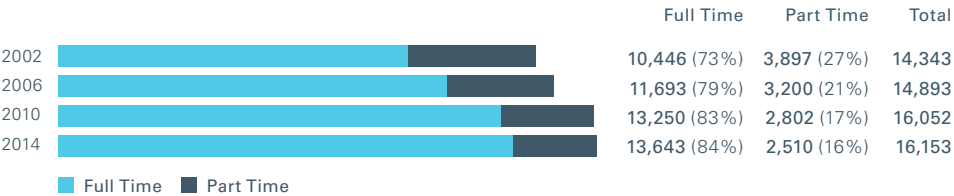

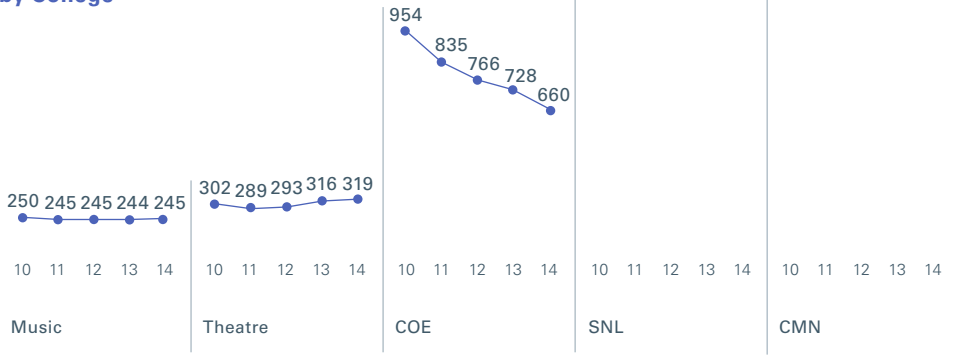
DePaul enrolled 16,153 undergraduates this fall, compared with 16,420 in 2013.

Full-Time and Part-Time Undergraduate Enrollment



- » Full-time enrollment has increased by 3 percent compared with 2010, while part-time enrollment has declined by 12 percent.
- » Eighty-four percent of all undergraduates are full-time, up from 73 percent in 2002.
- » All colleges have more than 89 percent of undergraduates enrolled full time, with the exception of SNL, which is mostly part time (87 percent).
- » CDM undergraduate enrollment grew by 9 percent in 2014; undergraduate enrollment in SNL, LAS and COE declined (down 14 percent, 10 percent and 10 percent, respectively).
- » BUS accounts for over a quarter of the undergraduate enrollment in 2014 at 27 percent, consistent with 2010. Compared with 2010, CDM, CSH and CMN account for a larger share of undergraduate enrollment, while the proportions in LAS, SNL and COE have declined.

Undergraduate Enrollment by College

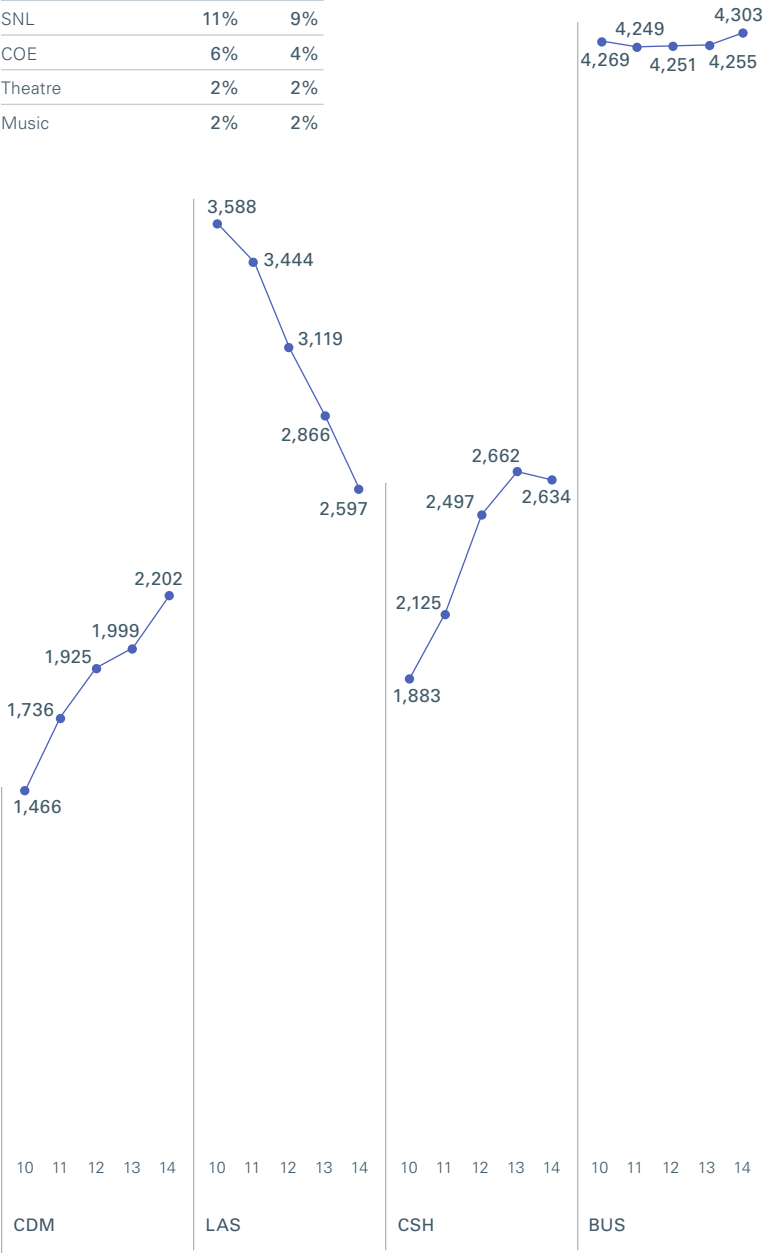

FRESHMAN ENROLLMENT

DePaul welcomed a class of 2,544 new freshmen in fall 2014, which is 5 percent more than last year’s class of 2,425 students. Enrollment increased by 35 percent in CDM, 16 percent in CMN and 11 percent in BUS. These increases offset double-digit declines in LAS, Education and Music. BUS continues to enroll the largest proportion of freshmen at 28 percent.

By Academic Profile

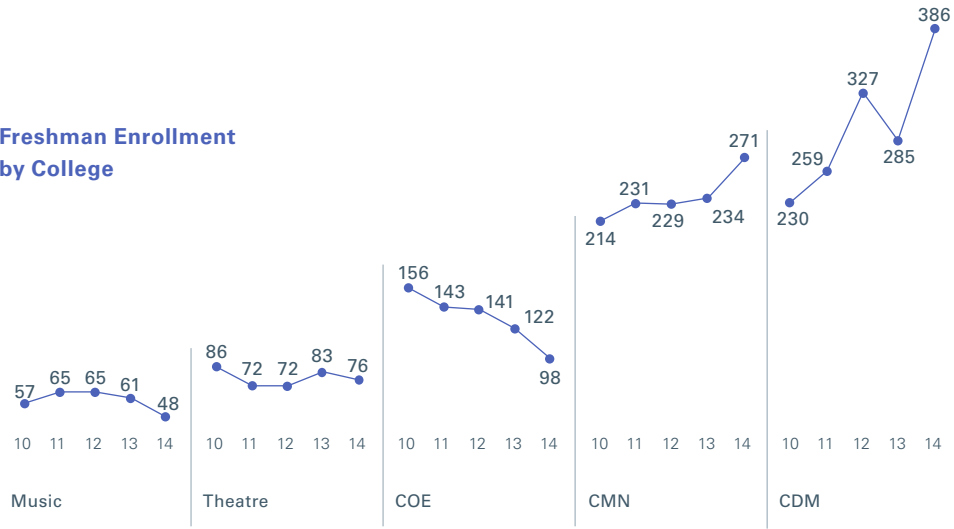
The freshman class is strong on all measures of academic preparedness.

- » The average high school GPA—the best predictor of academic success at DePaul—is 3.56. This is down slightly from a record 3.65 in 2013, but comparable with the averages from 2010-2012.
- » The average ACT composite score of all DePaul freshmen is 25.4,* consistent with last year and higher than 24.9 in 2010. The middle 50 percent of the class scored between 23 and 28. Nationally, the average ACT composite score is 21.0.
- » About 10 percent of the freshman class, or 258 students, enrolled in the Honors Program in fall 2014. This is the largest honors cohort ever at DePaul.

*ACT average includes scores for students who applied through the test-optional pilot program and submitted scores post-admission for research purposes.

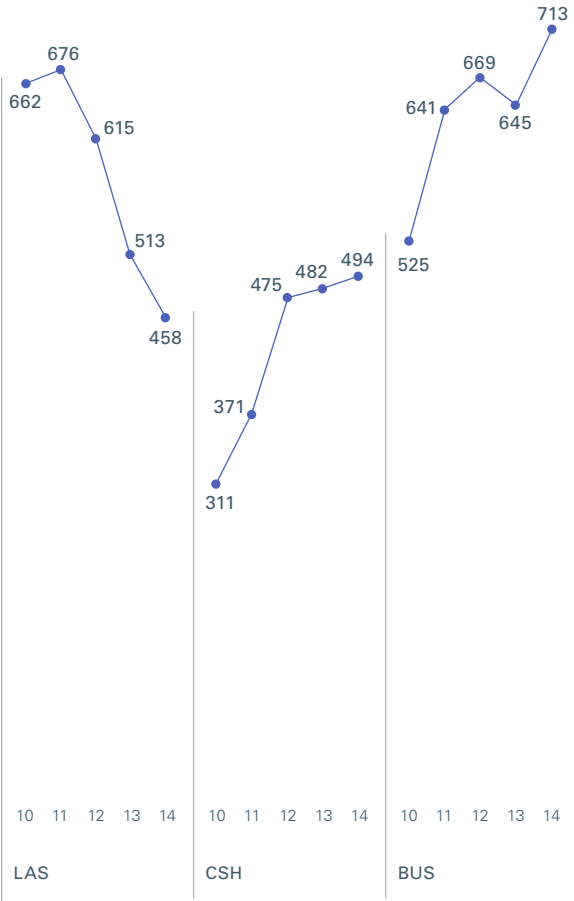
Freshman Enrollment by College

TRANSFER ENROLLMENT

Enrolling in fall 2014 are 1,580 new undergraduate transfer students, down 7 percent from 2013. Despite the overall decline, transfer enrollment in SNL, CMN and Music increased. Together, the four largest colleges for transfer enrollment—BUS, LAS, CSH and SNL—enroll 74 percent of transfers. Sixty percent of transfers come from community colleges. Forty-two percent of this fall’s new transfers enter DePaul with sophomore status, and 31 percent enter with junior status.

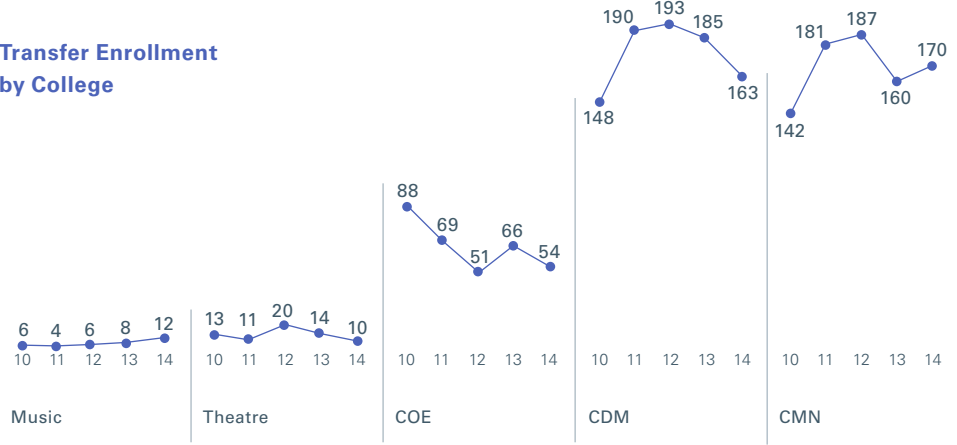
Throughout 2013-14, DePaul enrolled a total of 2,574 transfer students and 2,465 freshmen. This fall, transfers account for 38 percent of new degree-seeking undergraduates, compared with 41 percent in 2013.

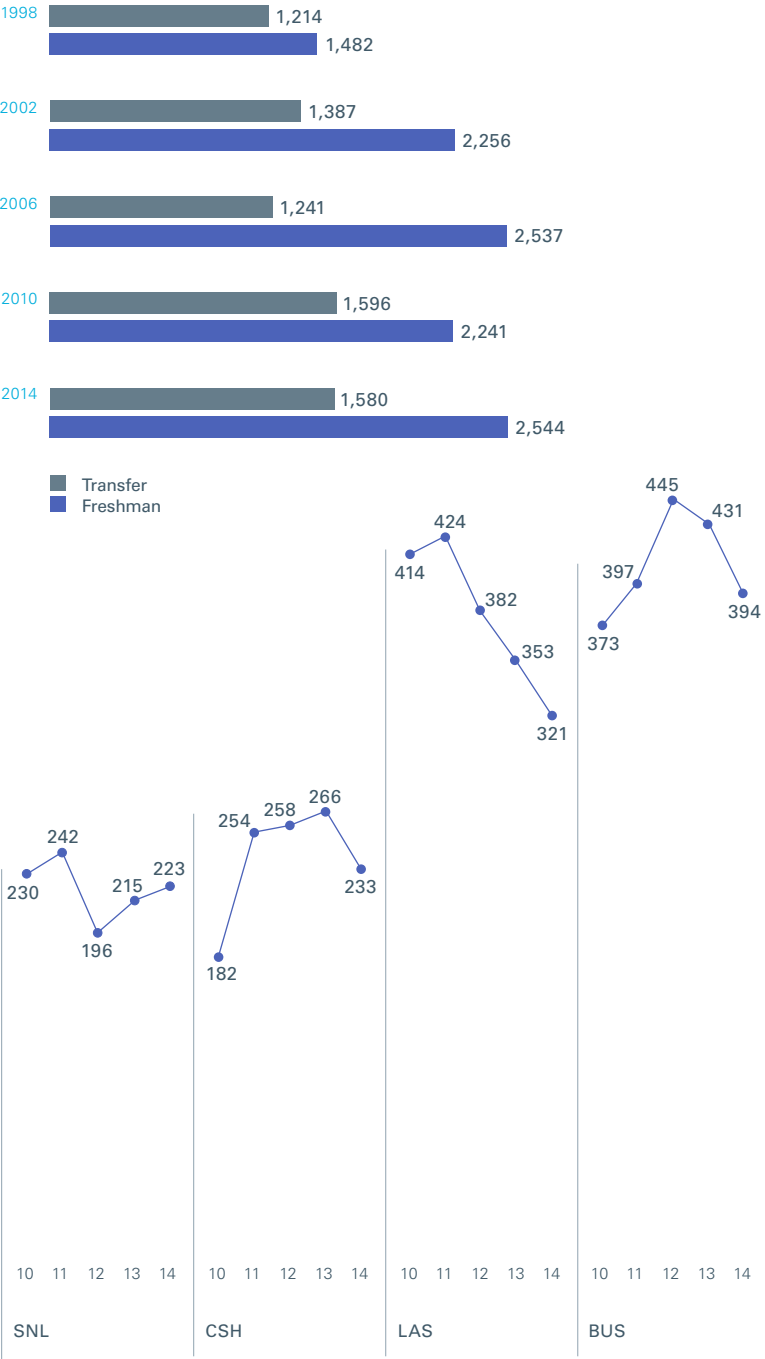

FRESHMAN AND TRANSFER DEMOGRAPHICS

Freshmen

By Gender

- » Less than half of all new freshmen are male (42 percent) in 2014, consistent with 2010.
- » Enrollment in CMN, COE, CSH, LAS and Theatre is more than 65 percent female.

By Geography

- » 45 percent come from suburban Chicago or elsewhere in Illinois, 37 percent from out of state or out of country, and 18 percent from the city of Chicago.
- » For the first time ever, California was the top state for freshmen (other than Illinois), sending 134 new freshmen this fall. Rounding out the top five are Michigan, Ohio, Minnesota and Wisconsin.
- » The 937 out-of-state freshmen come from almost 700 high schools throughout the nation.

First-Generation Freshmen

- » Enrolling this fall are 856 freshmen from families where neither parent has a bachelor's degree. First-generation students represent 34 percent of the freshman class.
- » Nearly half (48 percent) of this year's first-generation students come from suburban Chicago.

Transfers

By Gender

- » Half of all new transfers are male (50 percent) in 2014, compared with 49 percent in 2010.
- » Enrollment in CMN, COE, CSH, SNL and Theatre is more than 50 percent female.

By Geography

- DePaul remains a top destination for transfer students in Illinois.
- » 60 percent of transfers are from Illinois community colleges.
- » 26 percent are from out-of-state institutions.
- » 8 percent are from Illinois private and for-profit four-year institutions.
- » 5 percent are from Illinois public four-year universities.
- » 1 percent transferred with credit for equivalent experience.

By Age

- » 67 percent of new transfers are under 24, 19 percent are 24-29 years of age, and 14 percent are 30 or older.
- » SNL enrolls 42 percent of all new transfer adults and 71 percent of those who are 30 years of age or older.

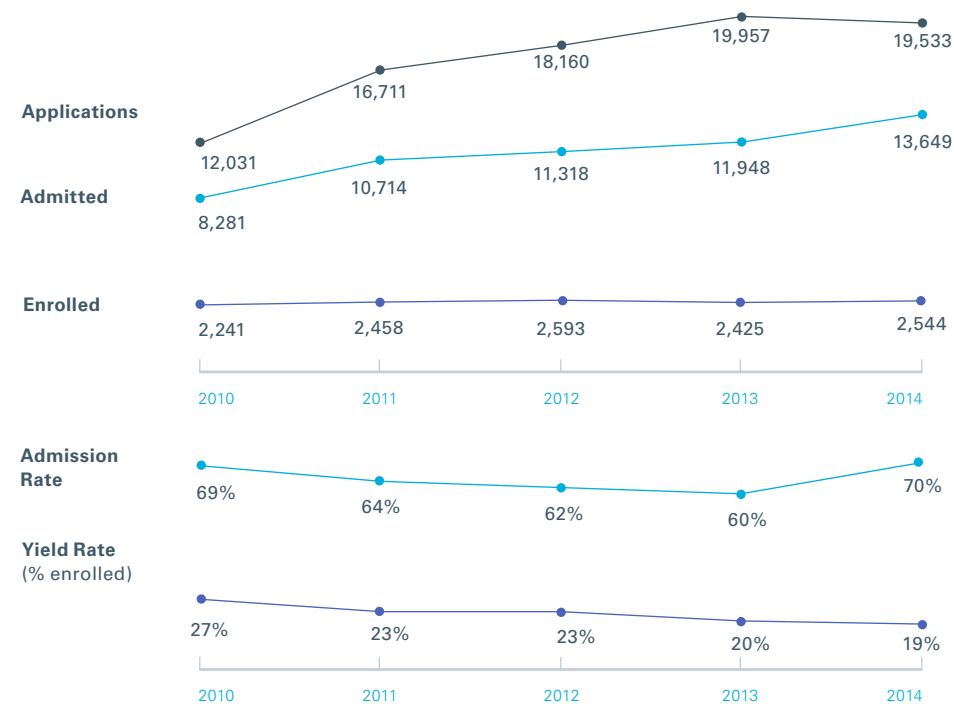

FRESHMAN ADMISSION TRENDS

DePaul received 19,533 applications for fall 2014, a 2 percent decline over the record from 2013, but a 62 percent increase from 2010. A total of 1,594 students applied through the test-optional pilot program.

- » Applications increased to CDM, Theatre and LAS. CDM accounted for 10 percent of applications in 2014, compared with 8 percent in 2013.
- » CSH received 27 percent of the applications at 5,280.
- » Similar to the past two years, 40 percent of applications came from out of state. California, Michigan and Ohio provided the most out-of-state applications.

TRANSFER ADMISSION TRENDS

Transfer applications declined for the second straight year to 5,020, down by 2 percent from 5,119 in 2013 and 9 percent from 2012's all-time record of 5,517 applications.

Transfer Applications, Admission and Enrollment Yield



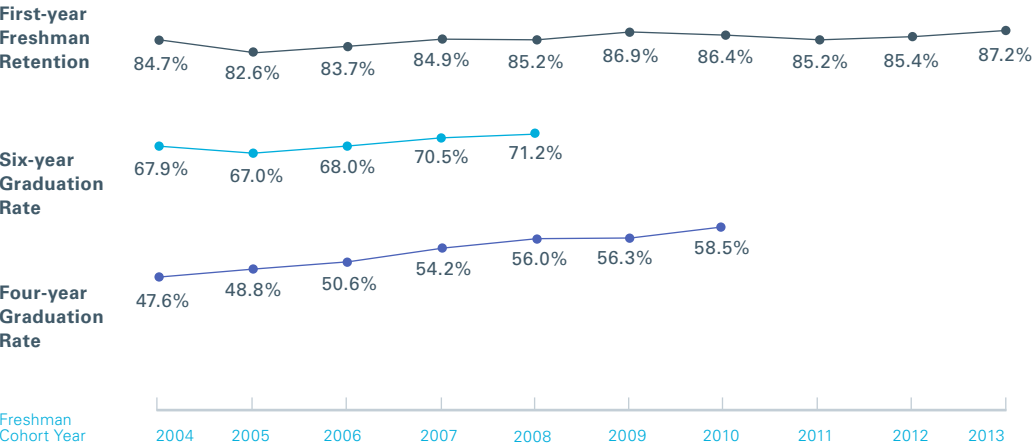
FRESHMAN RETENTION AND GRADUATION RATES

Returning in fall 2014 for their sophomore year are 87.2 percent of the fall 2013 full-time freshmen—the highest percentage in university history—compared with 85.4 percent of the prior year’s freshman class.

One of the most significant trends is the continued increase in four-year graduation rates over the past seven years. This year, the four-year graduation rate for the 2010 freshman class was the highest ever at 58.5 percent, increasing annually from 43.0 percent for the 2003 class.

Of the fall 2008 full-time freshmen, 71.2 percent had graduated from DePaul six years later, up for the third year from 67.0 percent for the 2005 class.

THE FOUR-YEAR GRADUATION RATE INCREASED FOR THE SEVENTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR.

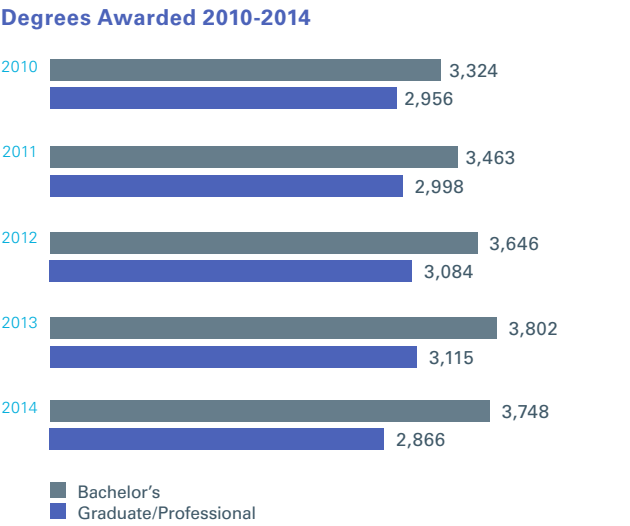
DEGREES GRANTED

In 2013-14, DePaul awarded 6,681 degrees. This was a 6 percent increase from 2009-10. DePaul awarded 13 percent more bachelor’s degrees, 4 percent fewer master’s degrees and 62 percent more doctorates. Law degrees (JD and LLM combined) remained the same during this time.

Thirty-five percent of bachelor’s degrees were awarded to students of color. The largest proportion of bachelor’s degrees awarded to Asian-American and Hispanic/Latino graduates was from BUS (55 percent and 29 percent, respectively), and the largest proportion awarded to African-American graduates was from SNL (33 percent).

A total of 1,793 bachelor’s degree recipients in 2013-14 entered DePaul as freshmen and took four years and one quarter, on average, to complete their degrees. Bachelor’s degree recipients in 2012-13* who entered as transfers (1,486 students) took, on average, three years to complete their degrees in colleges other than SNL, and SNL transfer students (329 students) took an average of approximately five years. Master’s degree recipients enrolled in an average of eight and one-half quarters to complete their degrees, although this has declined over time.

GRADUATE AND LAW ENROLLMENT

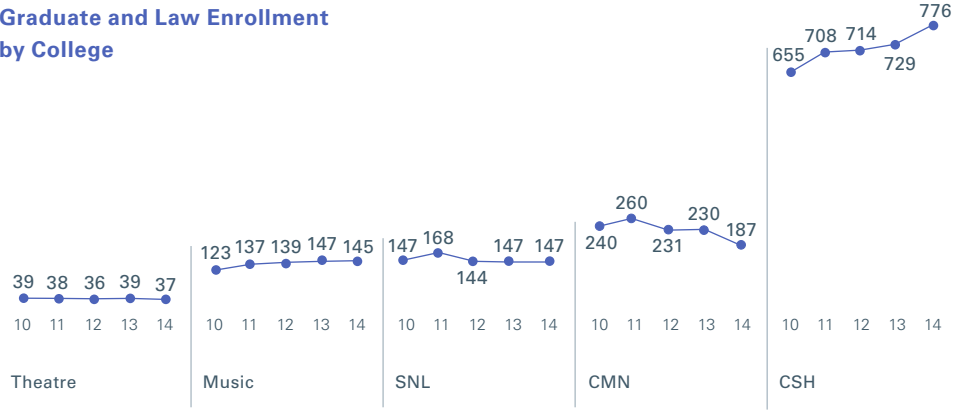
Graduate Enrollment

In fall 2014, a total of 6,844 graduate students enrolled (excluding Law). Although overall graduate enrollment is down 4 percent from 7,103 students in 2013, enrollment in CDM (the largest graduate college) and SNL held steady while graduate enrollment in CSH increased by 6 percent. A total of 93 percent of all graduate students are master's degree students, 4 percent are doctoral students, and 3 percent are in certificate programs or non-degree seeking.

- » 61 percent are enrolled full time, taking eight or more credit hours per quarter, up from 58 percent in 2010. Full-time graduate enrollment varies by college. The colleges with primarily full-time graduate enrollment include Theatre (100 percent), CMN (82 percent), CSH (69 percent), COE (67 percent) and KGSB (66 percent). The largest proportion of part-time graduate enrollment is in SNL (84 percent).
- » 28 percent are students of color (1,909 students), comparable with last year.
- » 13 percent are under 24 years of age, compared with 11 percent in 2010. Music had the highest proportion of young graduate students at 33 percent; 30 percent of CMN graduate students were under 24 years of age.
- » 12 percent, or 818 graduate students, are international students (on F1 and J1 visas), compared with 871 in 2013 and a 31 percent increase from 2010.

Law Enrollment

A total of 802 students enrolled in the College of Law this fall, a decline of 10 percent from 2013. Most law students are enrolled in the JD day program—80 percent—with 16 percent in the evening program and 4 percent in the LLM program.

- » 57 percent are female (53 percent in 2013).
- » 29 percent are under 24 years of age (31 percent in 2013).
- » 23 percent are students of color (21 percent in 2013).

New Master's Enrollment

The 1,677 new master's students enrolled in fall 2014 are a diverse group:

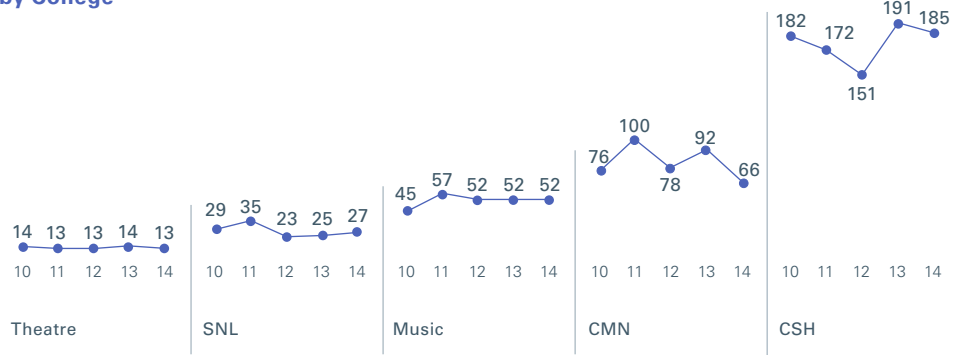
- » 56 percent are female (57 percent in 2013).
- » 48 percent are between ages 24 and 29, and 31 percent are under age 24 (45 percent and 31 percent, respectively, in 2013).
- » 26 percent are students of color (28 percent in 2013).
- » 17 percent are international students on F1 and J1 visas (13 percent in 2013); 53 percent of international students enrolled in KGSB and 33 percent in CDM.

The new master's students come from a wide range of locations:

- » 36 percent are from the city of Chicago (35 percent in 2013).
- » 34 percent are from suburban locations and elsewhere in Illinois (35 percent in 2013).
- » 22 percent are from out of state (25 percent in 2013).
- » 8 percent are from international locations (5 percent in 2013).

New Master's Enrollment by College

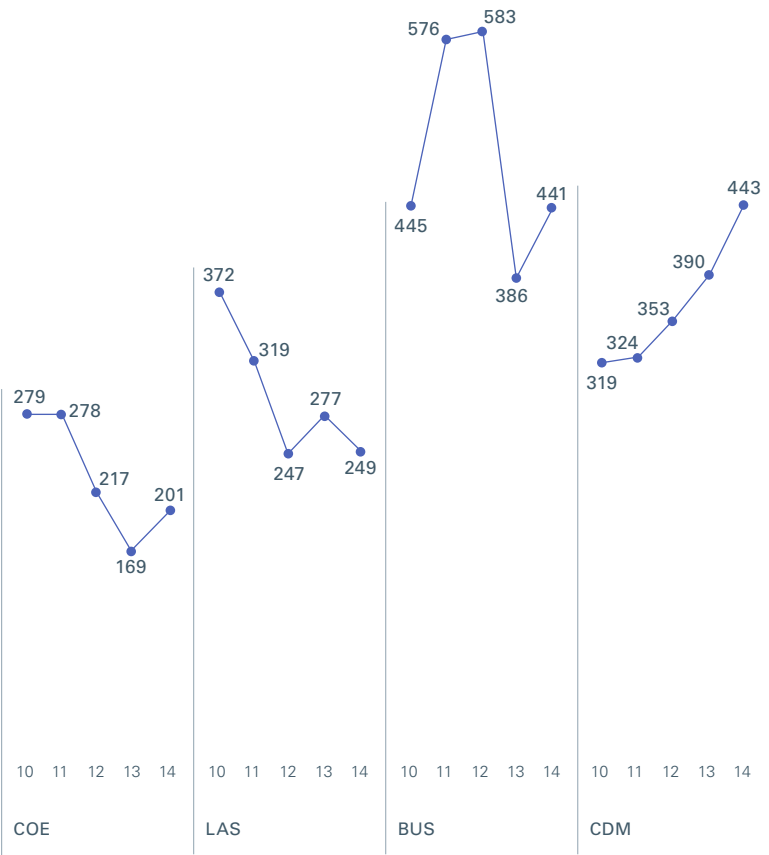


New Doctorate Enrollment

A record number of 68 new doctoral students enrolled this fall, compared with 63 in 2013. Almost half (43 percent) of these students were in CSH (including 15 new students in the nursing doctoral program), 40 percent in COE, 10 percent in CDM and 7 percent in LAS.

- » 63 percent are women (76 percent in 2013).
- » 17 percent come from out of state (30 percent in 2013), 43 percent from the city of Chicago (33 percent in 2013), 38 percent from suburban Chicago and other locations in Illinois (32 percent in 2013), and 2 percent from international locations (5 percent in 2013).
- » 21 percent are students of color; 13 percent are African-American.

New Law Enrollment

The College of Law welcomed 264 new law students this fall, compared with 312 in 2013. Of the law students, 206 are enrolled in the day program, 40 in the evening program and 18 in the LLM program.

- » 50 percent are under 24 years of age (58 percent in 2013).
- » 61 percent are women (50 percent in 2013).
- » 43 percent are from out of state, 31 percent from suburban Chicago and other Illinois locations, 23 percent from the city of Chicago, and 3 percent from international locations (40 percent, 38 percent, 21 percent and 2 percent respectively, in 2013).
- » 28 percent are students of color (18 percent in 2013).

DEPAUL LOCATIONS AND CREDIT HOURS

The Lincoln Park and Loop campuses generated the majority of fall credit hours, although the proportion has dropped from 89 percent in 2013 to 87 percent in 2014 due to the increase in the hours generated by off-campus locations and online classes. In 2014, 10,009 credit hours were generated at locations off campus, including overseas and study abroad locations, Cinespace and Rosalind Franklin University of Medicine and Science. This is up 59 percent from 6,288 in 2013. In 2014, online courses generated 25,128 credit hours, or 9 percent of all fall credit hours, compared with 8 percent in 2013 and 5 percent in 2010.

A total of 4,906 students registered for at least one online course, including 3,406 undergraduate and 1,487 graduate students. This is a 4 percent increase from 4,721 students in 2013, due to the 9 percent increase in undergraduates registered for online courses; graduate student enrollment in online courses is down 6 percent from 2013. Half of SNL students and CDM graduate students (51 percent and 50 percent, respectively) and 26 percent of CDM undergraduate students are taking at least one online course in the fall.

Of the students registering for online courses this fall, 1,759 students (40 percent) are enrolled exclusively online and not simultaneously enrolled in other campus-based courses (720 undergraduates, 1,038 graduate students and 1 law student). Continuing students make up 81 percent of this enrollment; part-time students account for 78 percent.

Of the exclusively online students

- » 65 percent are continuing part-time students.
- » 58 percent are master's students.
- » 26 percent are undergraduate seniors.
- » 37 percent are students of color.

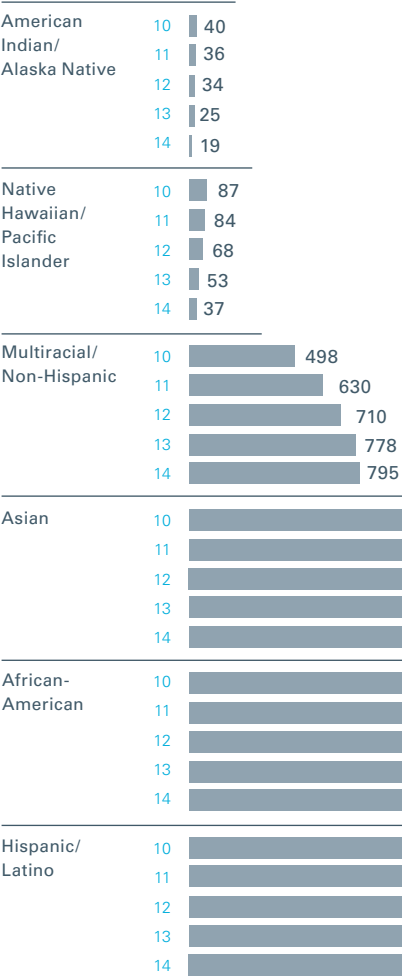

DIVERSITY

DePaul enrolled 8,139 students of color in 2014, compared with 8,213 in 2013. Students of color account for 34 percent of total enrollment, 37 percent of undergraduate enrollment, 28 percent of graduate enrollment and 23 percent of law enrollment.

The number of students who report themselves multiracial/non-Hispanic continues to grow annually, though the rate of growth has slowed. A total of 78 percent of these students are undergraduates.

International Students on F1 and J1 Visas

In total, 1,335 students have international student status (on F1 and J1 visas), compared with 1,328 in 2013 and 873 students in 2010 (a 53 percent increase). This year, about a third of international students are undergraduates, and two-thirds are graduate and law students. International students represent 6 percent of total university enrollment.

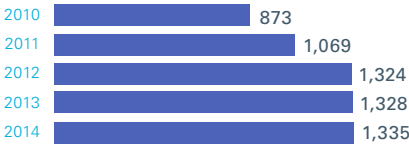
International Undergraduate Enrollment Trends

- » Since 2010, international undergraduate enrollment has grown annually from 225 to 477, although the rate of growth has slowed in recent years. At least half of these students enrolled in BUS annually.
- » International undergraduates come from more than 70 countries, with China the largest source and accounting for a third of international undergraduate students, followed by Saudi Arabia, South Korea, Malaysia and Nigeria.
- » 59 percent are men.

International Graduate and Law Enrollment Trends

- » A total of 858 international graduate and law students enrolled in 2014. Enrollment grew by 32 percent from 2010 to 2014. The largest proportion of students enrolled in KGSB and CDM (43 percent and 35 percent, respectively).
- » Students come from over 65 countries, with more than 40 percent from China, followed by Saudi Arabia and India.
- » 58 percent are women.

NATIONAL COMPARISONS

DePaul is the largest private, not-for-profit university in the Midwest and the 13th largest private institution nationally. DePaul has been the largest Catholic university in the nation for 17 consecutive years, having exceeded St. John’s University in total enrollment in 1998. DePaul enrolled 15 percent of the enrollment at the 10 largest Catholic institutions in 2014.

Since 2005, enrollment at the largest Catholic institutions increased by 7 percent to 160,373 students, an increase of 11,118 students. From 2010 to 2014, enrollment at these institutions remained largely unchanged, growing by 1,262 students. From 2013 to 2014, total enrollment was flat or in decline at nine of the 10 largest schools, with the exception of Fordham (increase of 0.9 percent).
